Dear Sir/Madam

I have lived and worked in the bush and remote outback of Australia for the past 36 years and only now have I come across a winch and anchor set up that actually works, in fact it goes well beyond my expectations.

Working and living in the outback and often by myself, the greatest fear is of being bogged with no way of getting out. I have over the years used many approaches from levers and fulcrums, come-alongs/hand-winches and electric winches.

All have disadvantages especially when I am by myself. Even the forward mounted electric winch is severely limited in comparison to the **Bush Winch**, principally because electric winches have a limited length of wire rope, which is heavy and can only pull in the direction of the anchor point, it can not pull backwards unless setup to do so.

I have now used the **Bush Winch** in very heavy situations; these were being bogged in a lake system (Lakeway, Wiluna) and in heavy sand country (Little Sandy Desert). The ease of use becomes very apparent. Initially I had changed the wheel studs in Perth before leaving, so when I did get bogged (back of the tray was within 30cms of the ground) it was only a matter of taking the **Bush Winch** out and fitting them on to the back wheels of my Toyota Landcruiser Trayback, this taking a mere moment to fit.

The nearest anchor point was some 90meters away and having purchased sufficient rope for such an emergency it was with ease that I took out the ropes to the anchor point. I drove out of the bog in low range with the greatest of ease, especially as I had full steering control. This would have been impossible with any other winch.

Although I have not yet used the Bush Winch to go backwards I can envisage that it would work backwards as easily as it works forwards. It also has the tremendous advantage that it easily transportable from vehicle to vehicle, unlike anything else that may compete with it.

I would highly recommend the **Bush Winch** to any person who goes bush, whether for a holiday, work or emergency services. It is simple and best of all, **no working parts to go wrong!**
